"Queen's Day" Concert for the Dutch Reformed Church – Sunday, April 27

Everyone encouraged to wear a touch of orange!

Newburgh, NY. – A special "Queen's Day" Concert for the Dutch Reformed Church will be given on Sunday, April 27, 3 p.m., at St. George's Episcopal Church, 105 Grand Street, Newburgh. Timed to coincide with the traditional birthday of the Queen of the Netherlands, the chamber-music concert will benefit the restoration of the former Dutch church, a National Historic Landmark designed in 1835 by A. J. Davis.

The benefit concert was organized by Wanda Fleck of the Netherland-America Foundation (New York), which provided financial support. The event is co-sponsored by Newburgh Chamber Music and the Newburgh Preservation Association, which works with the City of Newburgh to restore the landmark structure. (The Dutch Reformed Church, a block away at 126 Grand Street, will be open to the public from 1:00 – 2:30 pm on the day of the concert.)

Works by Johannes Brahms, Gabriel Faure, and contemporary American composer Kevin Beavers will be performed by a group of rising professional musicians: Jina Lee (violin), Beth Guterman (viola), Patrick Jee (cello), and Jeff Juan Choque (piano) Ms. Lee and Mr. Choque have been supported in their musical careers by the Netherland-America Foundation. Mr. Jee won First Prize in the first Holland-America Music Society Competition, supported by the foundation. Mr. Beavers, the award-winning Composer In Residence at the California Symphony, studied composition in the Netherlands under a fellowship from the foundation.

Tickets may be purchased for \$15 at the door, or \$12 in advance from the Newburgh Preservation Association, P.O. Box 206, Newburgh NY 12551. Tickets are \$10 in advance for groups of 6 or more. For more information, call (845) 562-8076. All proceeds go to the Newburgh Preservation Association to benefit the restoration. Refreshments will be served after the concert.

Following a popular tradition in the Netherlands on "Koninginnedag" (the Queen's birthday), everyone is encouraged to wear a touch of orange, the color of the Dutch royal "House of Orange."

Jina Lee (violin) was born in Korea and raised in Chicago, where she gave her solo debut at the age of 13. A graduate of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and the Sweelinck Conservatory (Amsterdam), she has given numerous recitals in Japan, the Netherlands, Germany, Canada and the U.S.

Beth Guterman (viola) is a 4th year student at the Juilliard School studying with Masao Kawasaki. She won the 2001 Nakamichi Lower Strings Competition at the Aspen Music Festival. Upcoming engagements include a recital in Longy's Pickman hall. Her first CD comes out this year on Naxos featuring music by Stephan Hartke.

Patrick Jee (cello) studied at the Yale School of Music and the Juilliard School. Hailed as a "gifted virtuoso," he has performed at the Aspen Music Festival, the Banff Centre for the Arts, Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, La Jolla's Summerfest, and the Seoul Arts Center. He has performed with orchestras in Buffalo, Rochester, Toulouse, and Paris.

Born near Cuzco, Peru, **Jeff Juan Choque** (piano) began his musical studies upon arriving in this country at the age of five. Earning his bachelor's and master's degrees at the Eastman School of Music, he was a three-time Fellow at the Tanglewood Music Festival. He has performed extensively as a soloist, recitalist, and chamber musician throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia.

The **Netherland-America Foundation**, founded in 1921, seeks to maintain and strengthen the ties of friendship between The Netherlands and the United States.
